Global Histories Lecture on Vietnam

"Viewing Vietnamese History through Art from Colonialism to the Present" by Professor Nora Taylor, School of the Art Institute of Chicago, Friday **November 4**, 7:30 pm Smith Hall 205

This talk will present a survey of Vietnamese painting from the establishment of the Ecole des Beaux-Arts d'Indochine in Hanoi in 1925, through decades of Vietnamese history up to the 21st century. Prof. Taylor will present the work of artists who have made a significant contribution to the nation's art history and discuss how historical, political and social circumstances have shaped artistic practices in that country over the past 100 years. Nora Taylor is a Chicago-based art historian of modern and contemporary Vietnamese art and professor of Southeast Asian Art History at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. She is author of *Painters in Hanoi* (Hawaii 2004 and NUS 2009) as well as numerous articles on Vietnamese art.

Tibetan Buddhism Lecturer on Campus

"Stories of the Buddha: Ancient, Medieval, Modern" by Professor Kurtis Schaeffer, University of Virginia (and former UA Religious Studies professor), Tuesday **November 8**, 7:30 pm, Gorgas 205

Stories of the Buddha's life are as old as the Buddhist tradition, and continue to be told today. Kurtis Schaeffer will highlight surprising continuities and profound changes in the life stories of the Buddha as they have been told in ancient India, medieval Tibet, and contemporary Europe and North America.

Vietnamese Art Exhibition

Visualizing War and Change: Untold Stories of Daily Life from Vietnam through Visual Materials (1945-2011)

Gorgas Library is hosting an exhibit which features twenty-two North Vietnamese post-World War II period propaganda posters, together with everyday objects, including books, veterans' diaries, postcards, movies and films, name tags from social organizations, stamp and money collections, and medals from fallen soldiers. These items express different narratives of the wars, from the government's official version to the personal inclusion of propaganda items in a child's life. Although generally silent, these narratives convey powerful messages about the memory of war as shared by generations of Vietnamese. The exhibit will be displayed **until December 16**.

Wed. 9th Nov. - Yellow Earth (1984), dir. Chen Kaige

A film lauded for beginning a new style of cinema in China, set in the 1930's, tells the haunting story of a peasant girl on the banks of the Yellow River who dreams for a life beyond poverty.

Tues. 15th Nov. – Red Sorghum (1987), dir. Zhang Yimou

A class tale of revenge, banditry and passion set in the Chinese countryside in the midst of the Sino-Japanese war that features the legendary Gong Li in her first role.

Tues. 22nd Nov. – Sacrifice (2010), dir. Chen Kaige

Chan Kaige's most recent film is a historic epic of tragedy, betrayal and revenge.

Mon. 28th Nov. – Under the Hawthorn Tree (2010), dir. Zhang Yimou

A moving tale of Forbidden love during the Cultural Revolution that was the most recent hit for Zhang Yimou.

Asian Studies Research Award

The Research Award in Asian Studies (including a \$150 prize) is given to a UA undergraduate who has conducted research or a creative project related to Asia, either as an independent study or as a part of a class, that the faculty has deemed exemplary. Submissions for the award must have a substantial engagement with some aspect of Asia. A faculty committee will determine the recipient. All students submitting research or projects are encouraged to submit them for presentation at the UA Undergraduate Research Symposium in the spring.

Students must submit their research or creative project by January 30, 2012, to asianstudies@as.ua.edu. All submissions must include a cover page with the student's name, CWID, email address, and a paragraph summary of the paper or project. For creative projects that are not in a paper format,

students should submit a 1-2 page description of the project and its academic basis along with appropriate documentation of the project (e.g., photos, video, audio files).
